Definition

The Indian Stamp Act, 1899 was a fiscal tax levied in the form of stamps on instruments recording transactions & Stamp duties (viz. Bills of Exchange, cheques, promissory notes, bills of lading, letters of credit, policies of insurance, transfer of shares, debentures, proxies and receipts) is levied by the Union.



Revenue Philately is a separate branch, very well known as Revenue stamp, tax stamp, duty stamp, or fiscal stamp are adhesive label used to designate collected taxes or fees on documents, tobacco, alcoholic drinks, drugs and

medicines, playing cards, hunting licenses, firearm registration, and many other things. For generate tax or revenue fiscal stamps were created.

It is pertinent to mention here that Revenue stamps often resemble postage stamps. They are not normally intended for use on mail and therefore do not receive a postal cancellation. Some countries such as Great Britain and many British Commonwealth countries have issued stamps valid for both postage and revenue, but this practice is now rare.

Difference between Postage and Revenue Stamp

These two categories of stamps serve separate purposes, with Revenue stamp being used to collect taxes and duties on financial and legal documents, whereas Postage stamps used in communication prepay the cost of mailing letters and parcels.



Modern Revenue and Commemorative Postage stamp

Advent of Fiscal Philately: The first British fiscal stamps were issued in 1853 and authorised for postal use in 1881. The Fiscal Philatelic Society (1902-1928) was established in twentieth-century by British philatelic society. In India, the court fee and revenue stamps of the princely states are collector's prime choice. There are princely states in India and most of them have revenue of two types for collection. The first type are court fees related to court proceedings. The Second type is Non-judicial intended for cheques, bills etc.

Scope of Fiscal Philately: The principle types collection that collectors attempt to accumulate materials related are application fee or petition, cheques, copy or copying fee, court fee (judicial), customs, documentary, duty, entertainment tax, foreign bill, forest department, forest permit, high court, hundi, law papers, motor vehicle fee, non-judicial, notarial fee, penalty stamp, petition, process or talbana fee, receipt, revenue, share transfer, special adhesive, special papers, toddy passes, telephone service, writing fee etc.

Fiscal Philately is a specialized branch of stamp collecting that focuses on postage and revenue stamps specifically used for fiscal purposes, such as taxes, fees, and revenue generation by governments and other organizations. In exhibit, collectors used to display the cancelled stamped paper which were punch or/and writing. On the Indian sub-continent except the British Indian area there were about 650 Princely States.

There were two types fees collected by imposing revenue-fixed fees where the rate was independent of the value in dispute. Fixed fees were used on receipts, powers of attorney and petitions. The second type are ad valorem fees dependent on the value in dispute.

The interesting area of study by collectors are serial number, date of sale, name of purchaser and stamp vendor. The learning areas includes printing characteristics (printing techniques, paper, date of use and type of revenue duty) taken through this document. Fiscal Philately is duly recognized in all Philatelic Exhibitions under the Revenue section (class-8). So, a fiscal collector can display his collection in any philatelic exhibition.

Investment Potential: Like traditional stamp collecting, fiscal philately can have investment potential, particularly for rare or historically significant specimens that may appreciate over time.

Educational Value: Collecting fiscal stamps can be an educational pursuit, teaching collectors about the intricate systems of taxation, revenue generation, and fiscal policies employed by governments and organizations worldwide. Beside the collection also emphasizes the rulers in princely state, the portraits of king in traditional clothing showing various parts of clothes. These parts are different in many area of the Indian sub-continent and thusly appropriate for the study of costumes, for instance turbans with ruler's portraits are popular among collectors.

Networking and Community: Engaging in fiscal philately can connect collectors with like-minded individuals through clubs, forums, and exhibitions, with their coat-of-arms and are very popular among collectors. The State Symbols represent animals, tree or letters to present.

The historical evidence reflected from the design with ruler's portrait is surrounded by ornamental figures. Most rulers in India were men, women were on the throne in very few cases. Examples of women with ruling powers were in Bhopal and Daphlapur states, but their revenue stamps did not bear any portrait. Only Bastar ruler - Profulla Kumara Devi is depicted on the Court Fees.

Variety and Rarity: Fiscal stamps come in a wide range of designs, denominations, and purposes, offering collectors a diverse and often rare selection to



explore and acquire. The rarity Cover-Overprints on revenue stamps (First Series-Foreign Bill embossed followed by the Court Fee series) The overprints generally consist of the name of state in one or two lines and were applied by typography. In nearly all the states

the overprint style was changed on adhesives two or three times during the various issues. The overprints applied on stamped papers are much larger in size. The overprints differ in the used providing opportunities for networking, knowledge sharing, and camaraderie.

Revenue and Court Fees Stamps

Design and Usage: Revenue and court fee stamps issued by princely states featured a variety of designs, often reflecting the culture, heritage, and symbols of the ruling state. Design with state's coat-of-arms and state symbols that attracts the attention of collector to study generally supporters, mottos and/or inscriptions and crests. Many of the Princely States issued revenue stamps and paper.

Variety: The revenue and court fee stamps of princely states exhibited a rich diversity in terms of design,



denomination, and purpose. Each state issued its own set of stamps tailored to its specific administrative needs and fiscal policies. Some smaller states with very primitive printing equipment issued revenue stamps where the

designs were handcrafted. The handcrafted designs are very interesting and many different dies are known., most interesting theme for true researchers.

Authentication: Similar to postage stamps, revenue and court fee stamps were typically affixed or impressed onto documents to indicate that the required fees or taxes had been paid. The shape and sizes of these stationery depending on hand stamped designs were mostly rectangular or circular or inverted heart shapes. The varieties for study includes colours of stamps, styles of values, colours of values etc.



Collectability: Revenue and court fee stamps issued by princely states are highly collectible among philatelists and historians due to their historical significance, artistic appeal, and rarity. Some stamps are particularly sought after by collectors for their unique designs, printing errors, or limited quantities.

Legacy: With the integration of princely states into the Republic of India following independence in 1947, the issuance of revenue and court fee stamps by these Overall, revenue and court fee stamps issued by the princely states of India under British rule provide valuable insights into the fiscal administration, cultural heritage, and political landscape of the time, making them fascinating subjects of study and collection for philatelists and historians alike.

There are several catalogues available specifically for fiscal philately enthusiasts. Some of the notable ones include the following.

Fiscal Philatelic Literature: There are numerous books, journals, and articles dedicated to fiscal philately. These resources provide valuable information on the history, types, and varieties of fiscal stamps issued worldwide.

Specialized Catalogues: Some general stamp catalogues, such as the Scott Catalogue, also include sections dedicated to revenue stamps and fiscal issues. These specialized sections provide listings, descriptions, and valuations of revenue stamps from various countries and periods.

Revenue Stamp Catalogues: Several catalogues focus exclusively on revenue stamps and fiscal issues. Examples include (i) The Court fee and Revenue Stamps of the Princely States of India by Adolph Koppel and D. Manner, (ii) The Indian Government Fiscal and Judicial Stamps and Stamp Papers by S.M. Blatt, A.M. Mollah & D. Heppel, (iii) The Barefoot Revenue Stamp by John Barefoot, (iv) The Catalogue of the Revenue Stamps of the United States, and (v) The International Revenues Stamp Catalogue.

Online Resources: There are online databases and websites dedicated to fiscal philately, offering

catalogues, images, articles, and forums where collectors can find information, discuss topics, and share their collections. By referring to these catalogues and resources, fiscal philatelists can enhance their knowledge, identify stamps in their collections, and discover new areas of interest within the hobby.

The Koppel and Manner catalogue is highly regarded among collectors and researchers for its depth of coverage, accuracy, and detailed information on fiscal stamps. It includes listings of stamps from both large and small Princely States of India. The catalogue typically provides details such as denomination, design, colour variations, usage, and valuations. Collectors and enthusiasts of fiscal philately often refer to the Koppel and Manner catalogue as a valuable resource for identifying, studying, and cataloguing revenue stamps from different Princely States of India and periods. It is considered an essential tool for anyone interested in building a comprehensive collection or conducting research in the field of fiscal philately.

ARCHANA-THE UNIQUE DEAD LEGACY PATRIKA POSTOFFICE



Archana- a Sub Post Office situated at Parbati Ghosh Lane, Kolkatta was set up to accommodate the need of a Bengali literary magazine on the same name during colonial period. The magazine was started by Krishnadas Chandra in association with Rabindranath Tagore in 1904.

The Archana Bengali magazine was enriched with famous authors from the West Bengal State with their contribution like Kabiguru Ravindranath, Natyacharya Girish Chandra Ghosh, Biplabi Bipin Chandra Pal, Kabisekhar Kalidas Roy, Akhil Neogy, eminent writers Anandasekhar Roy, Chitrita Devi, Dr Pratap Chandra Chundar and Asha Purna Devi to name few. The magazine got to its peak due to printing of about 75,000 copies and circulated throughout the State. With increase in spread of circulation, the nearby post office was unable to post the magazine in time force the British Government to set up a post office in the name of the magazine ARCHANA, a distinguish recognisation to a literally magazine for its popularity and public acceptance.

The magazine lost its glory and lifeless in 1960 but the post office in the same title continual its public service. A red letter box exists right in front of the ancient building which has accepted the modernization process of Department Post. The house "Archana Bhawan" where once the hub for magazine and sorting dispatch activities solely carried out for the popular magazine to various destinations of the state never changed the label. The magazine was managed through "Archana Parishad", Archana Printing Works, Archana Publisher etc. endures the Pincode- 700007 which still withstands a heritage past to relish the memory.

The City of Sobriquet - Nizams, Pearls, Biryani, Baghs, Bhagyanagar...

Did you know about the fascinating nick names of a capital city, the original city was founded on the banks of river Musi, now the historic old city home to Charminar and Mecca Masjid? The city was founded by Muhammad Quli Qutb Shah in 1591 ruled by



Mughal emperor Asaf Jah etc.

Hyderabad was a Princely State during 1869 and Nizam issued



Auronazeb.

more than 150 rare postal stamps, printed in London, lines engraved

by Rapkin, plate printed 160 stamps together manufactured by Nission and Parker, London. The designs were created by local artists. Those stamps highlight the state's culture by beautiful calligraphy, diverse languages and amazing architectural structures. Few stamps depict the monogram "Sarkar-e-Asafiya".

Being permanent residence of the city and stamp lovers, I have explored the metropolitan with fond memories. Let me initiate my voyage with the philatelic bureau located at GPO, Abids Road, Koti, Hyderabad. Dr Bibhudatta Mishra visited the city in February, 2024 and request me to pen down a philastory about the city.

The philatelic bureau was established before 1957 and catering the need of philatelists with stamps, materials, special covers, picture postcards, postmarks, Meghdoot Card, celebration cancellation etc. The First commemorative stamp released after independence by DOP on Hyderabad was Osmania University on its completion of 50th Anniversary in 1969.

All together there are five Permanent pictorial Cancellation (PPC) released from twin city Hyderabad

and Secundarabad. The first permanent pictorial cancellation was

Majestic Mosque-Charminar

The Charminar 'four towers' attached with four grand arches situated on the bank of Musi River, is the first tourist destination who visit this historic city. India Post issued lovely multicolor stamps and my



stamps, pictorial postcards, special covers, etc. on different GPO at Abids Road offer stamp collector a permanent pictorial cancellation (PPC) of Charminar since 21.04.1975. The Second PPC was on Rail Nilayam from Secundarabad Sub Post Office from 11.02.1976.



The third one is the famous educational Institute Osmania University under Jama-i-Osmania Sub Post Office since 11.10.1976.

Ronald Ross, the 1902 Noble laureate famous for discovery of the malaria parasites had worked in a military hospital for his pioneer experiments with mosquitoes in Begumpet, Hyderabad area during 1897. The heritage building was




renamed as Sir Ronald Ross Institute of Parasitology, a malaria Institute in 1955, recognized by Department Post with third PPC in 20.8.2021. A marble tablet in 1935 erected in the building for Ross memory although the building was custody of Deccan Airlines and Airport Authority of India before handover to Osmania University (medical college).



Golconda Fort, is situated in the western part originally known as Mankal built on a hill top in 1143. The inner fort contains ruins of palaces, mosques and a hill top pavilion, magnificent fortress complexes in India. Golconda still boasts of mounted cannons, four drawbridges, eight gateways, and majestic halls, magazines, stables etc. The outermost enclosure is called Fateh Darwaza meaning Victory gate. The fort gains an impressive place among the architectural marvels and heritage structures and Department of Post recognized the testimony to Hyderabad's glorious past with a PPC on 27.09.2021, the 5th one from my city.

The largest monolithic Buddha statue built in Hussain Sagar lake is carved out of single granite with height 17 meters and weight 320 tonnes installed on December 1, 1992.



Philatelist and Buddha theme collector can gather a PPC on Buddha statue from Himayath Nagar Sub Post Office under which locality the Hussain Sagar lake situated.

Mecca Masjid (Pictorial Cancellation)

Built with local granite, the arched gallery displays the tombs of all the Nizam's from the year 1803. The mosque has a length of 225 feet and is 180 feet wide with a height of 75 feet.



Salar Jung Musuem

The Salarjung Musuem was a store house of vast art and antique collection of a single person ranging from 2nd Century Bc to 20th Century AD. The museum was



opened to public in 1951 in the ancestral palace declared as 'Institution of National importance' in 1961 with display is in 38 galleries.

India post in 1978, issued a stamp in the name of museum portraying specimen available from the collection, a dagger and a fruit knife, in jade decorated with precious stones. The museum has collection of miniature paintings, modern paintings, bronze, textiles, ivory, jade, stone sculptures, Arms and amours, wood carvings, metal wares and manuscripts. The museum has the largest collection of "Bidri ware" in the world.

Hyderabad Security Press



Security Printing Press (SPP), Hyderabad was established in the year 1982 primarily to meet the requirements of postal stationery for Department of Posts, Ministry of Communications and Information Technology, New Delhi. The press has printed its first Commemorative Postage Stamp on Sri Pratap College, Srinagar in May, 2006.

National Police Academy (SVPNA)



Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel National Police Academy (SVPNPA), the premier police training institution in the country is located in my city established in 1967 and renamed after sardaar Ballav bhai Patel in 1974. India Post, on 27 November, 2008 on the occasion of the 60th Anniversary of SVPNPA released two commemorative stamps.

Hyderabad International Air Port

Located at Samshabad, Hyderabad was opened on 23 March 2008 had the credit of first airport in India to launch domestic e-boarding facility. The airport has got dedicated



Post Office PIN Code – 500108 with the opening of a new Post Office on 6th January, 2017.

Sports Event in Hyderabad

The Afro-Asian Games was an inter-continental multisport competition held between athletes from Asia and Africa. The event was held in my city between 24 October -1 November, 2003. There were 43 Asian countries and 53 African countries. The main event was at Gachibowli Athelatic stadium.


Hyderabad Haleem

Pallapita or Indian roller-the state bird


Lord Rama spotted the Palapitta before invading Lanka and vanquished Ravana. Palapitta has been chosen to put Telangana on the path of victory.

FAMOUS PERSONALITIES OF HYDERABAD

Dr. Burgula Ramakrishna

Burgula Ramakrishna Rao (13 March 1899 - 14

September 1967) served as the second and final Chief Minister of the former Hyderabad State. Before India's independence and the subsequent integration of princely states into the Union, he was a prominent Teluguspeaking leader who opposed



the Nizam in the princely state of Hyderabad. A multilingual academic, Rao was renowned for his expertise in Sanskrit and Telugu. Additionally, he was a poet and translator, with several notable works to his credit.

Dr. Sarojini Naidu

Sarojini Naidu (14 February 1879 – 2 March 1949) was an Indian political activist and a poet of very high esteem, often called "The Nightingale of India," due to the sensation that her poems created. She was the first woman to become the



governor of. She was the first Indian woman to have been made the president of the Indian National Congress and appointed as the governor of a state.

Dr. Zakir Hussain

The book under review has been written in simple language and lucid style but in one of the chapter (Page76-85) have touched the information for youth and new aspiring collectors who wish to learn Types of Collection, Terminology and Types of Cancellations without any images in language English and Hindi.

Tin Can Mail: A Remarkable Tale of Communication Amidst Isolation


In the early 20th century, the Cook Islands, scattered across the vastness of the Pacific Ocean, faced a significant challenge: staying connected with the rest of the world. The solution came in the form of an extraordinary innovation known as Tin Can Mail.

Conceived by Tom Neale, a New Zealander, in the 1930s, Tin Can Mail utilized empty food cans as unconventional mail carriers. Islanders would entrust their letters, postcards, and small parcels to these makeshift containers, sealing them tightly to safeguard the contents. When passing ships neared the islands, these cans were tossed overboard into the awaiting hands of local swimmers.

The arrival of a Tin Can Mail canister was a cause for jubilation among islanders. It brought news from distant shores, connected families separated by oceans, and facilitated vital communication between isolated communities and the outside world.

Despite its unconventional nature, Tin Can Mail was surprisingly reliable. Islanders established designated pickup points along the shoreline, where swimmers would eagerly await the arrival of the canisters. These brave individuals would then brave the currents and retrieve the cans, ensuring the safe delivery of their precious cargo.

The Tin Can Mail system fostered a sense of community spirit and cooperation among the islanders. It required coordination, trust, and a willingness to embrace innovation in the face of geographical isolation.



Even though this is an auxiliary postmark, without any place/city name like other postmark, stamp collectors are proud to possess a letter with this postmark in self-address. The editorial team of The Fila Capsule attempts to compile as much facts and study regarding the Auxiliary postmark used throughout India. There is found discrepancy in shape, size, color, language use, size of letters etc. The logo have introduced in the last part of February by Department Post and taken momentum in March-April. Interestingly, few registered and general cover receiving from other countries passing through foreign post office clearing hub have this unique mark with variation in size. In certain received letter the delivery mark was prominent with date of receiving. But, not all the registered cover within country has the privilege to receive this postmark. The team has received news that the campaign has been extended to meter franking registered speed post, picture post card and Registered Newspaper also. The language found in these released cancellation are English, Hindi, Tamil, Telgu and Kannad.

Talking Points – 2

The Timeless Legacy of Pursuing the Hobby

Madam Jeevan Jyoti is the Editor of Monthly e-Stamp Bulletin "THE RAINBOW STAMPS NEWS" since January, 2008 published from Dehradun as rainbowstampnews.blogspot.com. Till March, 2024 she has completed 195 uninterrupted issues and made a distinguished recognition for her contributions to literature philately. She is a life member of EIPA since 2005. Her philatelic interests are Tourism, Taj Mahal, Environment, Rainbow, Cancellations and Special postmarks with unique palindromic number 9.9.99. She has participated in philatelic exhibitions and bagged awards and laurels to her credit. The Editorial Team of "The Phila Capsule" is privileged to publish her inspiring talk in this version.

Please tell us something about your journey "The Rainbow Stamp News"?

The journey of 'Rainbow Stamp News' has been pretty good and still going on. It has completed 16 years of uninterrupted successful publication and now its 17th year going on. As it is a digital online magazine, it is read by the philatelists across the globe. I started it from a small town, Chopal of Shimla District in 2008. In those days Internet speed was very slow and I had to spend many hours continuously to post it on Blog. The idea of posting on Blog was given to me by senior EIPA member Mr. Bijoy Sinha. I am always thankful to him for this great idea. It clicked and Rainbow Stamp News on Blog became popular among philatelists. Now our team with Mr. Naresh Agrawal is going well he writes a regular column in Rainbow which is widely read and highly appreciated by philatelic community. Rainbow Stamp News is the first digital color magazine in India it's all issues right from the beginning are available online.

Can you share practical strategies or techniques you have adopted for continuing your dream child "The Rainbow" for so many years?

There is no strategy or technique it is just the love for philately and to spread it among others. However sometimes I thought of giving a break to it but could not do so as readers and contributors always encouraged me to continue it. I also personally felt that it was my good pastime during the posting in remote areas of Himachal Pradesh where I spent most of the



time at different places. But from the beginning it was my idea to make it simple and not too technical so that

it could be understood by all stamp lovers, beginners and serious collectors both

and also those who are not philatelists. This somehow idea worked and people from different walks of life got associated with



my magazine. Its readership increased not only in India but in other countries too.

How does succeed the extra miles (195 episodes) in enduring the literature philately for 16 years uninterrupted by you?

Yes, as I told it is the great encouragement I received from my contributors and Readers as well. My contributors have been regular and established writers whose articles were appreciated all over the world by the philatelists. Some prominent in the list are, Dr Avinash B Jagtap, Dr Satyendra Agrawal, Col. Jayant Dutta, and some more. Unfortunately, these eminent philatelists are not with us but their contribution to Rainbow will always be remembered. The other reason of its long continuation is that it is digital and could be published from anywhere.

How do you define an individual's success in pursuing philately?

Philately is a hobby which always gives you some knowledge as well as pleasure too. Stamps are small tiny pieces of paper, have so much to tell. It covers a variety of subjects, art, literature, science, history sports and current affairs. If one is associated with this hobby, one is well informed and somehow it adds some intellectual qualities to one's personality and sooner or later it pays them indirectly. Knowledge gained from any source is never wasted. Postage stamps are the biggest source of knowledge if one studies the picture on stamps, always gains something and it also refreshes one's mind.

Why is fostering innovation and growth vital for pursuing the hobby?

Well of course if one wants to enjoy a hobby completely and wishes to reach at the highest level, new ideas and innovative thinking are required because to reach at the peak one must think differently and learn techniques of presenting the exhibits and constant search for the particular items which can add colors to the exhibit, then only one can get satisfaction in a hobby. It does not matter what award one gets, but participation with passion is more important.

How can one navigate challenges and setbacks with grace in pursuing stamp collection?

In philately when one opts to participate in a competitive exhibition, the challenges are very high. In the beginning few years are spent in understanding the techniques of displaying the exhibits of a particular class because each and every class of philately is a vast field and one must have the technical knowledge of displaying the exhibit in a competition. When one crosses a basic threshold of the exhibition and reaches the higher-level step by step one needs both skill and money to present the exhibit. In every level of exhibition judging criteria varies, sometimes exhibitors do not get the award they deserve. At this point, one should accept it and try to learn more for the next exhibition. Sooner or later, it will be recognized in some other exhibition. I think one should take it as a hobby and try to learn to accept all these challenges and setbacks then only one can pursue the hobby in later years and enjoy it too. Participatipon is more

important than winning a higher medal as it makes you always updated and active in your philatelic field. When you do not participate you become a common collector or stamp hoarder you never become a philatelist. You do not learn new trends and the changes going on in the rules with the time. So, to remain associated with the hobby one must participate in the exhibitions.

What is your opinion about the fixed benchmarks by organizer of International and National Exhibitions, high-cost frame charges, the traditional standard etc. resulted no entry for new philatelists?

Yes, it is time to change the fixed benchmarks set by National and International Philatelic Federations as the hobby philately is not growing now. The main reason is new generation is not taking up this hobby as exchange of physical letters is almost finished and young generation does not come in contact of postage stamps, all communication is done through digital media. So, it is necessary to promote this hobby. Frame charges to be reduced and judging rules to be relaxed in all the classes especially the Thematic Class where the number of participants are maximum. The philatelists should be encouraged for participation. One Frame class needs to be awarded with medal as its frame charges are very high and instead of medal points are awarded in this class. In fact, one frame class is the future class and it must be encouraged. Multi frame classes are not affordable to everyone and also its preparation is highly time consuming. New collectors should be encouraged to participate and a new class for the first timers can be introduced in the exhibitions and its judging criteria should be different.

On what ways does the established benchmark by recognized International and National bodies (PCI) disconnect the journey of collectors after few years?

The main reason that philatelists stop participating after few years is 1. Cost of participation is very high (In both terms (1. Preparing exhibit and entry fee) At national and international level, Competition is very high and sometimes judging is not up to the mark. A philatelist is highly discouraged when one finds absence of uniformity while awarding medals. Often an average or below average exhibit is awarded a higher medal and a deserving exhibit gets a lower medal. It is a bitter truth and prevalent in the exhibitions at all levels that certain names are made popular by giving them higher awards and medals by the federations due to their own vested interests. Some get very much disheartened and do not accept it and disconnect themselves from further participation.

How can we prepare for the unpredictable future of this hobby to explore diverse opportunities and promote balance between physical activities and technology?

It is a fact that Philately is going around a limited group of philatelists. New young philatelists are not taking up this hobby. In some way it is losing its charm. It is important to make it easier for all. More emphasis to be given to youth philately and one frame class. Youth group must be encouraged; One Frame exhibition need to be promoted with suitable awards. So that more philatelists can take part as it is easier to manage and prepare. Time to time exhibitions should be organized in school and colleges. So that young generation may come to know about this hobby. Philatelic societies should come forward for the promotion of philately. EIPA, SIPA and some other philatelic societies in, Gujarat, Punjab, Maharashtra and other parts of India are doing lot of work for the promotion of philately. These societies need support and recognition from India Post. Together we can save this hobby.

Your message to budding and new collectors?

Philately is a hobby that gives both knowledge and entertainment. As one explores it, one comes to know its actual meaning and pleasure. Youngsters who are collecting stamps must see some good exhibits and try to learn the technique of exhibiting as there is difference in collecting stamps and presenting them in an exhibition. Whatever theme/class they choose must study it and try to study some good exhibits related to those subjects and classes. They should also visit philatelic exhibitions. It will be a guideline to them. They can develop their collection very well and present in an exhibition.



Extremities in a bird may relate to its form; ability; or a behavior and maybe there is large group of such birds who belong to extreme families per se. In this very first episode we shall understand about Greater Prairie Chicken.

Greater Prairie Chicken (Tympanuchus cupido)

The greater prairie-chicken is a charismatic and iconic bird species native to the grasslands of North America. Known for its elaborate courtship displays and booming calls, this bird holds a special place in the hearts of bird enthusiasts and conservationists.



Physical Characteristics: The greater prairie-chicken is a medium-sized grouse, with males typically larger

than females. Adult males, known as "boomers," can weigh between 2 to 3 pounds (0.9 to



1.4 kilograms) and measure around 16 to 18 inches (40 to 45 centimeters) in length. Females, known as "hens," are slightly smaller, weighing between 1.5 to 2 pounds (0.7 to 0.9 kilograms) and measuring around 15 to 16 inches (38 to 40 centimeters) in length.

Both males and females have cryptic plumage, with mottled brown and buff feathers that provide excellent camouflage against their grassland habitat. Males sport striking orange air sacs on their necks, which they inflate during courtship displays to attract females.

Habitat and Range: Historically, the greater prairiechicken inhabited vast expanses of tall grass and

mixed-grass prairies across central North America, from Alberta, Canada, to Texas, USA. However, due to habitat loss and



fragmentation caused by agricultural expansion and urban development, the species' range has significantly contracted.

Today, remnant populations of greater prairie-chickens can be found in fragmented patches of native grasslands, prairie remnants, and managed conservation areas throughout their historic range.

Behavior and Ecology: Greater prairie-chickens are primarily ground-dwelling birds that rely on grasslands for nesting, foraging, and roosting. They are highly social birds, often forming leks during the breeding season, where males gather to perform elaborate courtship displays to attract females.

The courtship displays of male greater prairie-chickens are a sight to behold, involving energetic footstomping, inflating of air sacs, and booming vocalizations that can be heard from afar. These displays serve to establish dominance among males and attract females for mating.

During the non-breeding season, greater prairiechickens form flocks that roam their grassland habitats in search of food, which primarily consists of seeds, grains, insects, and vegetation.

Conservation Status: The greater prairie-chicken faces numerous threats to its survival, primarily habitat loss, degradation, and fragmentation. Conversion of native grasslands to agricultural fields, urbanization, and intensive land management practices have significantly reduced suitable habitat for the species.



As a result, populations of greater prairiechickens have declined sharply across their range, leading to their

classification as a species of conservation concern. Efforts to conserve the greater prairie-chicken include habitat restoration, land management initiatives, and captive breeding programs aimed at bolstering dwindling populations.

Despite these challenges, dedicated conservationists and researchers continue to work tirelessly to safeguard the future of the greater prairie-chicken and its grassland habitat. Through collaborative efforts and targeted conservation actions, there remains hope for the continued survival and recovery of this iconic bird species in North America's grasslands.
