

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CRADLE OF THE INDIAN COSMIC PHILATELY

Continuing with the article on the subject, let's discuss various space missions venturing beyond Planet Earth. This part focuses only on the missions for which philatelic items have been issued in India.

Missions Beyond Planet Earth

Space missions are risky with a very high rate of failures. Hence most of the Philatelic materials are generally issued only after the successful missions. We are going to discuss about a few of them:

1st Manned Lunar Mission

Apollo 11 was a spaceflight conducted from July

16 to July 24, 1969, by the United States and launched by NASA. It marked the 1st time that humans landed on the Moon. Commander Neil Armstrong and Lunar Module Pilot



Buzz Aldrin landed the Apollo Lunar Module Eagle on July 20, 1969, and Armstrong became the 1st person to step onto the Moon's surface. Aldrin joined him later, and they spent about two and a quarter hours together exploring the site they had named Tranquillity Base upon landing. Armstrong and Aldrin collected 21.5 kg of lunar material to bring back to Earth as pilot Michael Collins flew the Command Module Columbia in lunar orbit.

Armstrong's first step onto the lunar surface was broadcast on live TV to a worldwide audience. He described the event as "one small step for man, one giant leap for mankind."

A Commemorative Postage Stamp was released on the 1st Anniversary of 1st Moon landing on 20th July 1970.

Indian Lunar Mission Chandrayaan 2

Chandrayaan-2 is ISRO's second lunar exploration mission after Chandrayaan-1. It consists of a lunar orbiter, the Vikram lunar lander, and the Pragyan rover, all of which were developed in India. The main scientific objective is to map and study the variations in lunar surface composition and the location and abundance of lunar water.



The spacecraft was launched from the second launch pad at the Satish Dhawan Space Centre in Andhra Pradesh on 22 July 2019. The craft reached lunar orbit on 20 August 2019. Although Vikram's lander couldn't do a lunar landing, the mission was a great success.

Kolkata Philatelic Bureau released a Holographic Special Cover on September 7, 2019, a day after a failed lunar landing by the Vikram.

Chandrayaan 3

Chandrayaan-3 is the third mission in the Chan-

drayaan programme, a series of lunar exploration missions developed by ISRO. The mission consists of a *Vikram* lunar lander and a *Pragyan* lunar rover and was launched from Satish Dhawan Space Centre on 14 July 2023. The spacecraft entered lunar orbit on 5 August, and India became the 1st country to touch down near the lunar south pole, at 69°S, the southernmost lunar landing on August 23, 2023, at 18:04 IST, ISRO became the first agency to land near the south pole of the moon in its 1st attempt and overall the 4th space agency to successfully land on the Moon, after USSR, NASA and the CNSA.



Bengaluru Philatelic Bureau released a special cover on the day of the successful lunar landing. Chennai Philatelic Bureau released a special cover on 1st Sep, 2023 to commemorate the occasion.



National Space Day

National Space Day in India commemorates the successful landing of Chandrayaan-3 on the Moon. It is celebrated on August 23 every year.





The 1st National Space Day was observed on August 23 2024. Bengaluru and Mumbai Philatelic

Mars Orbiter Mission (MOM)

Mars Orbiter Mission (MOM), unofficially known as *Mangalyaan*, is a space probe orbiting Mars since 24 September 2014. It was launched on 5 November 2013 by ISRO. It was India's first interplanetary mission and it made ISRO the 4th space agency to achieve Mars orbit, after the Soviet space program, NASA, and the European Space Agency. It made India the first Asian nation to reach the Martian orbit and the second national space agency in the world to do so on its maiden attempt after the European Space Agency did in 2003.

The mission was a technology demonstrator project to develop the technologies for designing, planning, managing, and operations of an interplanetary mission. It carried five scientific instruments. The spacecraft was monitored from the



Spacecraft Control Centre at ISRO Telemetry, Tracking and Command Network (ISTRAC) in Bengaluru with support from the Indian Deep

Space Network (IDSN) antennae at Bengaluru, Karnataka.





Aditya L1 Mission:



Aditya-L1 is a coronagraph spacecraft for studying the solar atmosphere, designed and developed by ISRO and various other Indian Space Research Institutes.



It is orbiting at about 1.5 million km from Earth in a halo orbit around the Lagrange point 1 (L1) between the Earth and the Sun, where it will study the solar atmosphere, solar magnetic storms, and their impact on the environment around the Earth.

The Aditya-L1 mission is a prestigious project of the ISRO. It is India's first mission to explore the Sun and will gather important data about the Sun for the next five years, which will be useful for understanding its dynamics and its impact on life. Aditya L1 was launched from the Satish Dhawan Space Centre at Sriharikota on 2nd September 2023. A Special Cancellation was released on the same day by Mumbai Philatelic Bureau.

The Aditya L1 Reached the intended Lagrange Point on January 6, 2024. On this day, a special cover was released by the Bengaluru Philatelic Bureau during the State Philatelic Exhibition – KARNAPEX 2024 under the theme of Science, Technology & Environment.



A Special cancellation was also released on the same day by Mumbai Philatelic Bureau.

Solar Parker Probe:

Parker Solar Probe was developed by NASA as part of the Living with a Star program to explore aspects of the Sun-Earth system that directly affect life and society. The spacecraft during its closest approach to the sun which occurred on 24th Dec. 2024, Zipped just 3.8 million miles from the solar surface while moving about 430,000 miles per hour. This close-up study of the Sun allows Parker Solar Probe to take measurements that help scientists better understand how material in this region gets heated to millions of degrees, trace the origin of the solar wind (a continuous flow of material escaping the sun), and discover how energetic particles are accelerated to near light speed.

Parker was launched on 12 August 2018. It became the first NASA spacecraft named after a liv-



ing person, honouring physicist Eugene Newman Parker, professor emeritus at the University of Chicago. A Special Cover on Parker Solar Probe was released by Mumbai Philatelic Bureau on January 2025 25th during the MAHAPEX 25.

GHOST VILLAGE POST OFFFICE

Located at the Eastern tip of the Pamban Island, in the religiously significant town Rameswaram is a

place called Dhanuskodi (end of the bow). The smallest town was busiest with hamlets, populations, churches, railway line, post office and an unaffected Kothandarmaswamy temple etc. border

between Srilanka and India once upon a time. The Dhanushkodi port and Post Office were opened for public on March 1, 1914. The town also had a big post of-



fice built with stone masonry and brick arch open-

ings. The place has been declared as ghost town after the cyclone of 1964 where the entire town was washed away with just a few remnants left and declared inhabitable. The Post office cachet

mark still survives in the memory and collection of philatelist with the round seal



clearly read place name DHANUSKODI, 7 September, 1955 and time of dispatch as 10.30 AM before the city marooned with the natural calamity by Bay of Bengal and Indian Ocean tidal wave in 1964. Currently, the post office is running in temporary coconut hutments since 2017 and provides banking facilities to the dweller fishermen.

SERENITY OF THE MANGROVE ISLAND CHORAO

An avid avian philatelist and nature lover, I had every good reason to visit the serene Chorao island, five kilometres away from the state capital of Goa – Panaji. Chorao has a delightful blend of natural beauty, vibrant wildlife, traditional Goan roots and a slower pace of life. The ferry ride on the Mandovi River from Ribandar side takes you



through the lush mangroves to reach the famous Salim Ali Bird

Sanctuary named after Bird man of India Dr Salim Ali. The avian diversity was celebrated with the introduction of Goa's 13th Permanent Pictorial Cancellation (PPC) released during MA-HAPEX-2025 and at Chorao SO on 23-01-2025.

I had decided to revisit the place from my native Margao on the day of release



and capture the mood at Chorao SO. Dr. Salim Ali Bird Sanctuary is located on the extreme left of the picturesque island, as you disembark from the ferry. Goa's only Bird Sanctuary is currently undergoing renovation work and closed to public. The Bird Sanctuary named after the eminent



ornithologist boasts a captivating variety of bird species, including kingfishers, eagles, herons, and species of migratory birds. My travel to the Chorao SO took me up a quaint, hilly slope, 7 kms away on the central part of the island.

I was the first guest to the small but well organ-




ised sub post office with PIN code 403102 to participate in the Date of Introduction of the Permanent Pictorial Cancellation. The cachet of

the Chorao SO PPC depicts a simple yet beautifully illustrated bird species of the White Egret, Common Kingfisher and Purple Heron found at Dr. Salim Ali Bird Sanctuary on the island. To my pleasant surprise, there was a red-letter box in front of the sub post office with text inscribed in Hindi and English "Letter posted in this letter box will be provided with a Special Pictorial Cancellation of Dr Salim Ali Bird Sanctuary", a gesture by the Department of Posts, India, well-appreciated by the philatelists and postal lovers.

Established in 1988, Dr. Salim Ali Bird Sanctuary has the objective of conserving and protecting the rich avian life, water bodies, mudflats, and dense mangrove vegetation. This creates an ideal habitat for the 400 bird species resident and

migratory home at Dr. Salim Ali Bird Sanctuary in Goa. The release of the Chorao SO PPC; two picture postcards, cancelled and



uncancelled that depict the White Egret and Purple Heron were also made available for sale at the counter by the Maharastra Postal Circle.

ISRO-TRIVANDRUM, P.O.-A PERILOUS REVISIT

Mr. Prakash Kumar Behera, Bhadrak



In 1962, eminent space scientists Prof. Vikram

Sarabhai and Dr. Homi Jehangir Bhaba were searching for a place to establish a Space research sta-



tion in the equatorial region. They finally found

Thumba a small fishing hamlet near Trivandrum, the capital of Kerala's southern state. Thumba was an unique choice because of its proximity to the geomagnetic equator.



The Thumba Equatorial Rocket Launch Station (TERLS) was established under UN sponsorship. In the beginning, the ancient St. Mary's Magdalene Church, graciously dedicated by the local inhabitants at the altar of science, served as the office and the laboratories. The 'Bishop's House' forming part of the Church, was once used as the office of the Director, TERLS. The Church was later converted into a Space Museum which now attracts regular crowds including students and the public.

On November 21, 1963, a two-stage sounding rocket, 'Nike-Apache', was launched from TERLS marking the beginning of Space exploration in India. Recognising the special value of this unique facility slightly off the magnetic equator, Indira Gandhi, then Indian Prime Minister, dedicated TERLS to the United Nations on February 02, 1968. With his, there was a quantum jump in the scope for research in aeronomy and atmospheric sciences in India. In due course USA, USSR, Japan, France and Germany started launching sounding rockets from TERLS. While the initial sounding rockets were imported, India went on to establish indigenous capability in manufacturing and launching sounding rockets

under the Rohini Sounding Rockets Programme (RSR).

TRIVANDRUM ISRO PO

The first known cancellation from ISRO PO was dated 11 Aug 1971, in Astrophilatelic cover created by J Koch.



We may assume the Permanent Pictorial Cancellation which was been issued in the year 1977 had got its inspiration from the J koch cachet

Usually space cachet makers are associated with only one country's space activities, even if covers bear different space launch centres, all they belong to the same nation (for instance, Goldcraft covers bear postmarks at Wallops, CC, VAFB, etc but not for space events outside USA).

German dealer Koch (you can see the signature at the right bottom of the covers illustrated above) produced covers for rocket launches in Thumba from 1971 to 1972. Exactly seven covers for Thumba launches were issued on the following dates:

ERRORS ON BANGLADESH STAMPS

Mr. Nisarg Sutaria, Ahmedabad



Errors are sometime offer good monetary by philatelic investors and collectors. Printing errors are have unintentionally defects created some of the rarest and most visually striking stamps in the world. The obscure error stamps that attract only the attention of a few specialist collectors and shown to public during exhibit displays. The factors influence such possetion depends on conditions and rarity. In recent year, the printing process has automated reducing the number of error stamps but collectors invest few on affordable price to capture the fastest growing in terms of popularity.

From design and engraving, to colouring, printing and perforation stamps errors found at every stages. Although a strict quality control followed by every issuing countries, due oversight and human errors such problems occur. The errors are broadly classified under following categories—Design, Denomination, Omission, Over print, Inverted, missing, Double impression, Colour spread and shift, missing colour and water mark, thickness of paper, imperforate, misperforation, tete beche, over or under inking, Ink smear, Albino, Gum, Miscuts, unprinted areas.

Error varieties are classified into three major groups:

Constant and part-constant varieties are differences that are stable and recurring in identical form on the same fields between all (constant) or multiple (part-constant) stamp sheets of the same issue.

Plate flaws- Differences in impression originating from defective, damaged or worn printing plate. If a result of a worn plate, a flaw can be

progressive (e.g. becoming more prominent during production).

Over Print flaws-Defective, damaged and worn printing plates can be used also in overprinting.

Coincidental varieties result from errors in production process. They are non-uniform and ephemeral.

Types are differences that originate from variations in materials and in ways these materials are used in production (color, paper, gum, perforation, typography, etc.) and also the differences that:

-originate from print preparation process,

-discriminate stamps between printing runs, are produced intentionally, or at least knowingly, derive from handling during printing process.

EDITORIAL TEAM

The provided article details postage stamp design errors from Bangladesh, highlighting a fascinating aspect of philately. These errors, ranging from color omissions to misspellings, offer a glimpse into the human fallibility inherent in the stamp production process. Such mistakes, though unintended, transform ordinary stamps into highly collectible items. Bangladesh's philatelic history, as evidenced by these errors, reveals the challenges and intricacies of producing national symbols. The errors serve as tangible reminders of the delicate balance between meticulous design and the potential for human error, adding a unique chapter to Bangladesh's postal history.

Silver Jubilee Stamp Error

In 1977, the 25th Anniversary of the Regency of Queen Elizabeth II stamp Miniature sheet was issued.







In 1983, the 1977 stamp was reprinted with over print "Nov, 83 and Visit of Queen". A 10-taka stamp, was released with a glaring mistake. The overprint read "Nov. '33" instead of the correct "Nov. '83". This blunder was quickly spotted, and the error was corrected, making the misprinted stamps highly collectible.

The Over print stamp has several error such as Over print (8 3) broken. In some stamps the over print is shifted to right, left

or upper side.



The unique printing error made this stamp more valuable for the collector. The varieties error observed are Overprint double variety, Overprint shifting etc.

BANGLADESH TER

Nobel Prize Stamp Debacle





Professsor Muhammad Yunus, founder of Grameen Bank and a pioneer in microcredit, has received accolades Noble Peace Prize in 2006. A commemorative stamps released by Bangladesh Postal Department on 29th August 2007. However, the stamp was riddled with errors!

Firstly, a close watch of the stamp shows the Nobel Prize medal for Physics or ত মহাঃ ইউন্স ও প্রামীণ ব্যাংকের নোবেল পুরস্কার অর্জন '০০ Chemistry behind the portray of Professor Yunus, instead of Peace Prize. Secondly, the name "Muhammad" was incorrectly abbreviated as Md. The stamp



was swiftly withdrawn, and a corrected version was issued just five days later. The updated stamp correctly spelled "Muhammad," dis-



played the Nobel Peace Prize medal. This incident highlights the importance of accuracy in stamp design and the quick response of postal authorities to rectify errors.

VOYAGE THROUGH EUROPA STAMPS

Col Akhil Kumar and Anubhav Gupta

Before proceeding ahead with my story on EU-ROPA cept stamps of year 1958, I wish to update the readers of Phila capsule about a *dead country* called SAARLAND who participated in this series for two years.



Postal History of Saarland

Saarland's postal history reflects its shifting sovereignty. Under the League of Nations (1920–1935), Saar issued its own stamps. Reintegrated into Germany (1935), it later fell under French control (1945), using French stamps until issuing its own (1947–1959). After reunification with West Germany (1957), Saarland adopted German postal services in 1959. The first stamps (as shown on the left side) of the Saar were contemporary German stamps overprinted "Sarre" (the French name) and with a heavy solid bar striking out the "DEUTSCHES REICH" at the bottom of the stamp. The return of the Saar Area to German control was commemorated on 1 January 1957 by a special stamp as shown on the right-side.



In 13th September 1958 the third issue of this series again selected a common design for the stamps which

shows "A dove flying above the letter E of Europe" symbolizing the cooperation of the European Postal Services as a vehicle of realizing a United Europe. The designer was Mr Andre Van der Vossen of the Netherlands. This year Switzerland abstained from issuing Europa stamp but Turkey

made a debut but also violated the common design rule.

In 1957, the Romanian government-in-exile operated as a symbolic resistance against the communist regime established in Romania after World War II. Led by Romanian political figures who fled the country following Soviet occupation in 1947, the exiled government aimed to garner international support for Romania's liberation from communist rule. It was based in Western Europe and the United States, advocating for democratic restoration. Despite its efforts, it lacked official recognition from major powers. With the fall of communism in 1989, Romania transitioned to democracy, rendering the government-in-exile obsolete. Its role remains significant in preserving Romania's pre-communist political ideals. This government also issued two sets of Europa stamps.



















Belgium, France, West Germany, Italy, Luxembourg, Netherlands, Saarland, Romania Government in Excile and Turkey.



On the 13th September 1958 the third issue selected again a common design, a dove flying above the letter E of Europe, designed by the Dutch art-

ist, André Van der Vossen. Turkey replaced Switzerland that year. (8 countries; 17 stamps).

WHISPER OF THE NIGHT-ENCOUNTER WITH FROGMOUTH

The night unfolded like an ink-stained canvas as I found myself deep within the lush forests of the Australasian realm. The air was heavy with the scent of damp earth and the subtle murmur of unseen creatures rustling through the underbrush. My journey had begun with a singular purpose—to witness the enigmatic frogmouths, a nocturnal family of birds veiled in the shadows.

Armed with a flashlight and an insatiable curiosity, I tread carefully through the dense foliage. The moon's silver glow filtered through the canopy, casting ethereal patterns on the forest floor. I had read much about these secretive avians, but no description could prepare me for the haunting beauty of my first encounter.

A soft, throaty call pierced the silence, drawing my attention to a low-hanging branch. There,

camouflaged against the gnarled bark, sat a **Tawny Frogmouth (Podargus strigoides)**. At first glance, it seemed as if the bird was merely an extension of the



branch itself, its mottled gray and brown plumage blending seamlessly with its surroundings. Its wide, flattened beak and piercing yellow eyes gave it an almost mythical appearance—an ancient sentinel of the night.

I remained motionless, heart pounding with excitement as the bird tilted its head, observing me with a calm, unyielding gaze. Unlike owls, which

are swift and silent hunters, frogmouths rely on their extraordinary camouflage to evade detection. As I marvelled at this master of disguise, the faint rustle of wings above signalled the presence of another.

Following the sound, my beam of light fell upon a second marvel—the **Marbled Frogmouth** (Podargus ocellatus). This species, more elusive than its tawny cousin, bore a mesmerizing pattern of white spots scattered across its darker plumage, resembling moonlit leaves. It perched delicately on a slender branch, its posture serene yet alert. I had learned that the Marbled Frogmouth favours the humid rainforests of New Guinea and northeastern Australia, where it preys upon insects and small vertebrates under the cover of night.

The forest whispered secrets as I ventured deeper, each step drawing me further into the realm of these mysterious birds. My thoughts drifted to the diverse species of frogmouths, each uniquely adapted to its habitat. These nocturnal creatures belong to the **Podargidae** family, closely related to owlet-nightjars, swifts, and even humming-birds. With their large, gaping mouths, they expertly snatch moths and beetles mid-flight, while their cryptic plumage renders them almost invisible by day.

Malaysia 2013

It was well past midnight when I encountered the most elusive of all—Gould's Frogmouth (Batrachostomus stellatus).

Native to the lowland forests of

Borneo and Sumatra, this bird is a rare jewel of the night. Its plumage, a rich tapestry of chestnut and cream, shimmered softly beneath my light. The delicate star-like speckles on its feathers explained its scientific name, *stellatus*, meaning "starry." I watched in awe as it emitted a low, resonant call, a sound both otherworldly and comforting in the dense solitude of the forest.

The frogmouths' lives are intricately tied to their environments. Their nests, often shallow platforms of twigs, cradle their precious eggs as both parents share incubation duties. These birds embody patience and resilience, traits that have allowed them to thrive in their nocturnal niche. Yet, despite their fascinating existence, only three of their number have graced the world's postage stamps, forever capturing their elusive beauty.

Australia, a land rich in natural wonders, has honoured the **Tawny Frogmouth** on several stamps. This bird, a beloved fixture in suburban gardens and wild woodlands alike, symbolizes the mysterious allure of the Australian night. With its sombre gaze and impeccable camouflage, the Tawny Frogmouth remains a treasured emblem of the country's nocturnal biodiversity.

The Marbled Frogmouth, rarer in the public eye, has found its place on stamps issued by Papua New Guinea. Its ghostly presence in the rainforest canopy is immortalized in these miniature works of art, a testament to the nation's rich ecological heritage. Through philately, this shadowy sentinel reaches the farthest corners of the world, inspiring wonder and curiosity.

Gould's Frogmouth, named in honor of the 19th-century ornithologist John Gould, has also earned its place in philatelic history. Stamps issued by Malaysia and Indonesia celebrate this avian treasure, reminding us of the fragile ecosystems where

it dwells. Each stamp serves as both a tribute and a call to protect these delicate habitats from the encroaching threats of deforestation and climate change.

As dawn's golden fingers crept across the horizon, I lingered a moment longer, savouring the echoes of my nocturnal pilgrimage. The frogmouths had revealed themselves like whispered secrets in the dark, weaving a spell that would forever bind me to their shadowy world.

Through the language of stamps, their silent stories continue to travel beyond the forests and into the hearts of those who seek to understand the unseen marvels of the night. And as I retraced my steps through the waking forest, I knew that my encounter with the frogmouths would remain an indelible chapter in my journey of wonder and discovery.

Species

Most of the frog mouth belongs to genus- *Batra- chostomus, Podargus or Rigidipenna*.



The species are

Tawny frogmouth, Podargus strigoides

Marbled frogmouth, Podargus ocellatus

Papuan frogmouth, Podargus papuensis

Philippine frogmouth, *Batrachostomus septimus*Large frogmouth, *Batrachostomus auritus*

Dulit frogmouth, *Batrachostomus harterti* Gould's frogmouth, *Batrachostomus stellatus* Sri Lanka frogmouth, *Batrachostomus moniliger* Hodgson's frogmouth, *Batrachostomus hodgsoni*

Sumatran frogmouth, *Batrachostomus poliolophus*Javan frogmouth, *Batrachostomus affinis* Sunda frogmouth, *Batrachostomus cornutus* Palawan frogmouth, *Batrachostomus chaseni* Bornean frogmouth, *Batrachostomus mixtus* Solomons frogmouth, *Rigidipenna inexpectata*

There are not much stamps on these species issued from different countries. DNA hybridisation studies had suggested that the two frogmouth groups may not be as closely related as previously thought, and that the Asian species may be separable as a new family, the Batrachostomidae. [3][4] Although frogmouths were formerly included in the order Caprimulgiformes, a 2019 study estimated the divergence between *Podargus* and *Batrachostomus* to between 30 and 50 mya and forming a clade well separated from the nightjars and being a sister group of the swifts, hummingbirds, and owlet-nightjars. The name **Podargiformes** proposed in 1918 by Gregory Mathews was reinstated for the clade.

ZERO BUDGET PHILATELY THROUGH POST CROSSING

Postcrossing (<u>www.postcrossing.com</u>) is an online platform where members send and receive postcards from random participants across the globe. It's not just about the postcards, but stamps play a significant role in making the exchange special for collectors.

There's something magical about holding a post-card in your hands—a tangible piece of someone's story sent from miles away. My journey with Post crossing began as a simple curiosity after reading a newspaper cutting way back in 2012, but I was not aware of its power. I sent the first five post-cards in September 2012, and the hobby remained stagnant until 2017.



Incidentally, I met Col Akhil Kumar, the founder and president of the Post crossing Welfare Society of India over a cup of coffee and soon this hobby blossomed into a cherished art of collecting stamps with the joy of connecting with people around the world.

Over time, my collection grew to 1300 postcards. Each postcard was a window into a different world. I've received cards from over 70 countries, each with its charm. Some showcased stunning landscapes or iconic landmarks, while others were adorned with quirky art or heartfelt messages. I loved deciphering the unique handwriting, imagining the sender carefully choosing their words.

Post crossing has taught me to appreciate the small joys of life. It's a reminder that in this digital age, a simple handwritten message can bring warmth and humanity. I remember the cards I received from the war-ridden Ukraine or the civil unrest in Bangladesh. It expanded my horizons, introducing me to places I'd never heard of and

inspiring me to learn about different cultures, histories, and traditions.


Through Post crossing, I've also formed unexpected connections. A retired school teacher from Denmark sent me loads of information along with beautiful postcards about a ruined lighthouse that



was preserved for safety. A nurse from the Czech Republic shares her pain and happiness through postcards, one at a time. A post crosser from Singapore wrote tons of cards showcasing his day-today work life. These moments remind me that even in a vast world, small acts of kindness can create profound bonds. And mind it, every postcard comes with one or 2 stamps.

The simple math in Post crossing is "A card in return for a card you sent". A postcard from India

needs to spend between Rs. 10 to 30 towards cost of a postcard



age to send across the globe. In return, he or she might get a card from the USA, Europe or Australia with stamps worth more than a Dollar. I call it Zero Budget Philately. This idea crystallized with 100s of progressive like-minded people/ students across India to form a pan-India registered society to facilitate the passion on a zero budget. Post Crossing Statistics

There are 248 countries participating in this voyage of picture postcards sending and receiving including special region, dependent territory, or special areas for geographical interest. Russia has the highest registered members of more than 1,13,000 with maximum over 80 million postcards sent worldwide. India registered 11,000 members and 5,50,000 postcards sent to many countries. There are many countries where members number is zero but postcards sent by the group members. Interestingly, there are 804829 registered members from 210 countries with 80% contributions from women, 17% from male collectors and Russia contributes highest 14% sending to other parts of the globe. The post crossing was created by Paulo Magalhães a Portugal students way back on July 14th, 2005 with goal: to connect people across the world through postcards, independently of their country, age, gender, race or beliefs.

UNITE FOR A TB-FREE INDIA-SEAL THE FIGHT AGAINST TUBERCULOSIS

Demon at Home

TB, an ancient disease referenced in the Vedas, saw early 20th-century efforts in India with sanatoriums in Tiluania (1906), Almora, and Shimla. The United Mission Tuberculosis Sanatorium (1912) and anti-TB societies in Lucknow and Ajmer advanced the fight. Lady Linlithgow's 1937 appeal funded the TB Association of India (1939). Despite progress, the Bhore Committee (1946) revealed a severe bed shortage for millions of patients. Pre-mid-20th century, treatment relied on nutrition and open-air therapy. The TB Division in DGHS (1946) renewed India's focus on combating TB.

Start of journey at homeland

The Christmas seal first appeared in India in 1941 under the supervision of Sherwood Hall who brought the concept to India. He arranged the design and printing with two main ideas

A medium to raise the fund to fight tuberculosis and celebrate with a seal of Christmas in the season of giving. These labels were used primarily by the Europeans for correspondence among each other within India and abroad. The first appeared in India during 1941-42 the **year of issue was not mentioned but later on was mentioned after 2nd issue 1942-43**. Initially it was printed outside India and brought so predominant colour of were red and green (Christmas Colour)





In the second year the number of seals went from 25/pane to 35/pane, the sheet margins were smaller (there was a war and economy was important) and the margins were used for descriptive text: "FOR THE PREVENTION AND CURE OF TUBERCULOSIS" [top] and "FOR THE ERADICATION OF TUBERCULOSIS IN INDIA" (bottom).



The design is more 'Indian' (but invokes the Magi), the colours are not as obviously a Western presentation of Christmas. your area or Seal Headquarters in Madras]. The year is printed in Black and Red. the Cross of Lorraine, the symbol for crusade against TB is larger and the design is completely secular.

The emphasis is on curing tuberculosis, not the holiday. Wartime printing in India did not meet the highest standards of printing or of quality control.

In this printing the inscription "The third year of the seals" was added. From this point on, the marginal inscription of each year's sheet included the number of years in which Indian seals are used.



"Salaam "an Arabic Word Mean "peace" was also included, indicating an awareness of other cultures in India. The headquarter address was Madar, Ajmer Instead of Madras.

The Madras Union Sanatorium was affiliated with British, America and Canadian tuberculosis missions and the health Bond denom-




inated in dollars may have been designed for American or Canadian Contributors. There were also many American soldiers in India during WWII.



1950 onwards Tuberculosis Association of India started to issue the seals, starting with "Peacock sitting on the steps of a temple" (1950) & "Mother and Child" (1951).

In India, we do not call the seal the 'Christmas

Seal' as is being done in other

coun-



tries, as Christmas is not the only festive occasion in our country. Other festivals like Dussehra, Puja, Diwali, Id etc. are equally important and in a secular state like India emphasis on any particular festival was not considered desirable.

Therefore, the Tuberculosis Association of India decided to name the Campaign, 'The TB Seal Campaign'.

The Campaign starts on 2nd October Gandhi Jayanti Day and it terminates on another important day for the Association i.e. 23rd February, the Foundation Day of the Association.



On these occasions the Association appeals to the people to remember that they have a duty towards their brethren stricken with tuberculosis and as a token of their sympathy for the cause requests them to purchase TB Seal. The TB Seal conveys the important message that tuberculosis is preventable and curable and that its victims can, if diag-

Printing Technical Information



The Seals are of 3 cms x 2 cms size horizontal/vertical from perforation to perforation. Perforation are similar to the one used in the postal stamps.

Seals are printed on gummed imitation chromo art paper of good quality. Each sheet of 60 seals and a Booklets of 600 seals each (10 sheets in each booklet) are printed. Varied themes published

from handicrafts, classical Indian dances, Indian flowers to wild animals, historical monuments, masks, railway engines, birds, vintage cars, brides of India act.

A Souvenir is also released along with the stamps every year till now and remain as a key source of raising fund.

These campaigns were highly successful, engaging the public in the fight against the disease and contributing to advancements in medical science. Today, the TB Seal remains a poignant reminder of the global efforts to eradicate tuberculosis and the power of community-driven health initiatives.

Celebrities have often used their platforms to raise awareness about tuberculosis and the significance of the TB Seal. For instance, renowned figures

like Audrev Hepburn, who was a UNICEF Goodwill Ambassador, emphasized importance of fighting TB. calling it "silent killer" that requires global attention and com-



passion. Similarly, actor and activist Danny Glover has spoken about the TB Seal campaigns, praising their role in mobilizing communities and resources to combat the disease. He once said, "The TB Seal represents hope—a symbol of our collective commitment to ending suffering and saving lives." These words from celebrities highlight the enduring legacy of the TB Seal as a beacon of solidarity and progress in the fight against tuberculosis.


